# Impact of the schools use of funding on children's progress Progress across the School academic year 2015/2016

Progress is considered at national expectations at 4.0 APS at Key stage One and 3.0 APS at Key Stage Two; giving broadly 3.5 APS across the school. The table below shows overall progress across the school for academic year.

The proportion of children making expected progress overall was above national averages with 100% making above in reading and writing and 92% in maths. The proportion of children exceeding was 42% in reading, 75% in writing and 58% in maths. All Pupil Premium children met or exceeded their predicted targets. Pupil Premium children have made progress above non Pupil Premium children in all subjects across the whole school. This is an improvement on end of last year.

- Whole school. 58% exceeded their target in Maths, 75% in writing, 42% in reading. This is a significant improvement on end of last year.
- Whole school progress of PP slightly above non PP children in maths and reading, above in writing
- KS 1 Pupil premium children made more progress than non PP children in writing and reading in KS 1, only slightly more in Maths.
- KS 2 PP reading and maths progress broadly in line (reading slightly below) with non PP children. Writing progress PP above non PP
- Whole school writing progress is a strength with PP

- Gap between PP and non PP slightly wider than end of last year.
